Supporting Two Ridings makes lasting change possible

Two Ridings is a major regional grant maker in North & East Yorkshire, York and Hull. The generous support of individuals, businesses, councils and other funders has enabled us to distribute £2.1 million this year.

That's 632 grants made to community organisations all over the region, enriching the lives of local people and enabling communities to survive and thrive.

Our role as a place-based, relational funder sees donors trust us to understand the real issues affecting local people and to reach the communities that are most often unseen and unknown by other funders.

Our leadership network, strong partnerships and local insights ensure our work has a deep positive impact over the long term.

Getting the money to where it is needed most

The cost of living crisis has been at the forefront of both our appeals and our grant making, and we are proud to have raised over half a million pounds to tackle it.

With the enforced poverty associated with the crisis following directly on from the trauma of the pandemic, the most vulnerable people across our region are suffering most acutely.

Many of the community organisations who offer vital services have struggled themselves to keep pace with demand.

We have systematically distributed funds, firstly to the people most immediately affected, and then more strategically to enable the local organisations to survive and carry on their crucial support.

We have seen first-hand just how crucial their work remains, and how modest amounts of money can have an outsized impact.

The appeal remains open. Winter is going to be incredibly challenging for many. With your help, we will be there to support them.

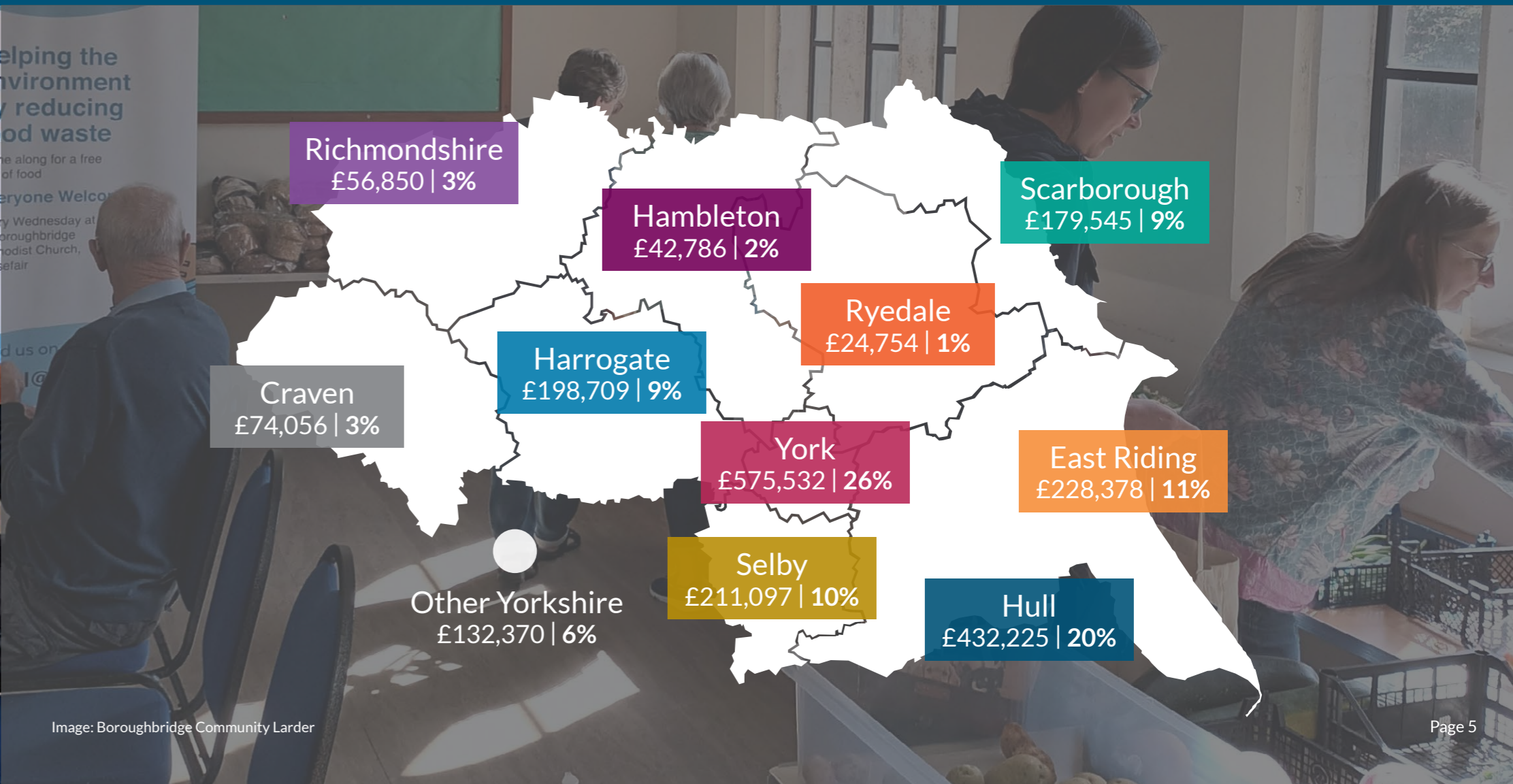

People at the heart of everything we do

Community organisations know their people and the issues affecting them

People across Yorkshire come up against hardship and suffering for many different reasons. The grassroots community organisations we support make a huge impact on the lives of thousands of people - often on a shoestring and with thanks to dedicated volunteers and staff who give hours of their time and care.

At Two Ridings, we know these people, we see their amazing work. We see the effect their work has on people. This is what drives us. We are privileged to be able to support them.



Leaving no one behind Enabling people all over Yorkshire

Children's wellbeing will always be central to our aims here at Two Ridings, and the cost of living crisis has put a huge strain on many more people, driving them into poverty.

A third of our funding helps children and young people directly, and those living in poverty.

9% of our funding goes to people experiencing homelessness and 7% supports older people.

Our funding also supports people with mental health difficulties, people from minority ethnic communities, asylum seekers, those living with alcohol and drug addictions, ex-offenders, survivors of crime, families, refugees and those from the LGBTQ+ community.

We do not leave anyone behind.

Breaking the cycle of poverty

“Two brothers who come from a family that have only experienced living on benefits have turned their lives around through the project. One now has an apprenticeship at Mercedes and the other is doing a welding

course at Hull College. Outkast believe everyone needs nourishing. That’s why they do it. Seeing young people grow in confidence and self belief and going on to college and employment is what it’s all about.”

Giving young people the drive to succeed

Outkast Panda Crew teach young adults vehicle maintenance and repair in a welcoming and supportive environment. They learn how to do basic servicing and put these new skills into real-world practice through race events where the young people are the pit crew and the mechanics.

But in doing so, we have discovered that the root causes of it go much deeper. Many of the young adults we work with have mental health issues that they feel they cannot address elsewhere. We encourage people to talk about their issues and our diverse group of volunteers have become role models the young people aspire to.”

The idea to become a Community Interest Company started when the Outkast Panda Crew, a group of car enthusiasts, attended a memorial run, with their pristine modified car

on the Brandsholme estate in Hull. Some young people were tearing up the verges on their motorbikes, causing chaos at the memorial.

Johnny, the founder of Outkast challenged them and on doing so, found they were bored and had ‘nothing to do’. He introduced them to cars, modifying them, mechanics and maintenance. Those same young people have gone on to do mechanic apprenticeships, welding courses and a marshalling course.

How funding impacts different communities

Lived experience transforming lives

For 30 years John watched his son slowly deteriorate through his addiction to alcohol. Dan was often out of control, regularly hospitalised, didn’t care about his own life and his actions were deeply affecting the lives of those who loved him.

“I always thought he would die very soon, and it nearly killed me too. And then one day he came back from a hospital stay and talked, for the first time about doing some cooking and watching some television with someone.

He had met Mark from York in Recovery, and that interaction, and the prospect of those two simple activities were the start of his life turning around.”

Dan realised that there were other people, just like him, who had experienced life in a similar way to him. He also saw that their lives had changed for the better.

York in Recovery gave Dan hope. Engaging in small activities that he could relate to brought meaning back into his life. Now Dan regularly cooks tasty treats at the group’s Recovery Cafe. He’s also created and hosts a pool session for the community and crucially chats and supports other people. “Now is the first time in my life I can talk to Dan as an adult,” said John, “rather than someone who is out of control.”

John is now a Director at York in Recovery and a very active volunteer. His own lived experience as someone who has years of exposure to the pain of addiction gives him a huge insight into other people’s circumstances. And helping others provides real purpose in his life.

You saved my life Jeff's story

When Jeff's* 20-year marriage broke down, he continued to work but had nowhere to live. He paid maintenance to his wife so she could pay the mortgage and keep a roof over his children's heads.

A proud man, Jeff had never been in a situation like this before, and didn't know where to turn. He gave his wife most of his wages and just kept enough to put petrol in his car and left himself only £20 for the week ahead. There was no way he could manage and Jeff fell into a spiral of hard times.

Next Steps gave him a home cooked hot meal daily, made him hot drinks and provided him with shower and washing facilities. He was very embarrassed, but those simple gestures and support gave him back his dignity, enabling him to function at work, be clean and fed.

They then introduced him to Citizens Advice for local housing support and Jeff is now in temporary housing. Jeff now only goes to Next Steps just to smile and say thank you on a weekly basis to the staff and volunteers, only occasionally taking up the offer of a hot meal.

"You saved my life!" is what he tells them.

Transforming communities through grant making

No poverty Reducing hardship and food insecurity

20% of our grants went to reducing poverty and ending hunger.

The cost of living crisis has meant that foodbanks and community food stores have become the norm for many people. Community centres have also ramped up their offerings of free meals and warm spaces.

Good health and wellbeing Addressing mental health and loneliness

A quarter of the money we distribute improves the health and wellbeing of local people. This funding addresses multiple mental health challenges, as well as loneliness and social isolation.

Providing inspiration for people Connecting through food

Addressing loneliness and isolation of local people, Lifeline use their funding for their fortnightly lunch club which is an integral part of their charity, and has been since they were formed 10 years ago. Lifeline work with people experiencing homelessness and those who are vulnerably housed, providing supported accommodation in six 3-bedroomed houses in Harrogate.

The lunch club is open to current residents but is also attended by former residents who have moved onto independent living and employment and can therefore provide inspiration to those who may be struggling. Sharing food together and a game of pool, in a relaxed atmosphere enables some of the town's most vulnerable people to discuss things they might otherwise feel they have to keep to themselves.

Creating sustainable communities Where people learn and participate

For whole communities to thrive, people in neighbourhoods need opportunities to learn, to train, to build relationships and to have purpose.

A third of our funding contributes to this goal, creating sustainable cities and communities.

Funding enlivening a whole community Improving anti-social behaviour

Gilberdyke Scout Hut is a hive of activity when we visit with lively 'Squirrels' – children aged between 4 and 6 – busy at play. A heartening example of what young people experience if given a warm and dry space where they can play and learn.

“Without our first grant from the Wind Farm fund to mend our roof the Scout hut

wouldn't be here at all, let alone these busy Squirrels having regular fun!”

Close by, a funded multi-use games area at Eastington is used by organised teams and ad-hoc players alike, a very welcome addition to the community. What the local organisers didn't expect was the complete end of anti-social behaviour because of the new area.


“Not only has the Multi User Games Area been a brilliant addition for players to practise and compete against one another, but we also no longer get vandalism in the village because the young have somewhere to go and something to do!”

Shifting the power Why working in a participatory way matters

How many people does it take to make a decision? But more importantly who should those people be?

We are actively working to devolve the power of decision making to people living closest to the issues impacting them.

Over the last year, 90 people have taken part in our funding panels, ensuring money is directed to the people and places most in need of it.

Whether it is Jackie in rural East Riding on a community fund panel or Mason, a young person in Scarborough, deciding which youth groups will make the most impact for him and his peers, every voice is equal.

Building the leaders of the future

HEY Confident Futures Leadership Network has gone from strength to strength. After scrutinising the impact in the first three years, the National Lottery Fund confidently supported the programme for a further three years.

We continue to deliver a wide range of work focussing on three core areas: the individual, the organisation and the place.

Our training runs throughout organisations, developing CEOs and senior leaders. Our work with the organisations supporting Black, Asian and minority ethnic citizens has grown into a collective known as the Leadership Advocacy Network who are gaining funding and a voice for the refugee, asylum seeker and first-generation immigrant communities in Hull.

As members of Yorkshire Accord, we actively develop coaches within the network with over 20 people engaging in one-on-one coaching support.

Supporting the region's CEOs

Our work creates a space for the senior leaders to be connected, deepen their learning and feel heard, culminating in a trusting and connected sector.

New to leadership focus

The jewel in our HEY Confident Futures crown is the ‘New To Leadership’ programme, which has been described as ‘life changing’ by every one of the 26 leaders who have taken part to date.

It is such a personal journey for every person on the course. It's intimate, transformative and gives them the space to understand themselves and permits them to get off life's complex treadmill. Through that, they grow themselves, support their team and the whole region flourishes.

Inspiring investment in Yorkshire

Richard set up a fund with Two Ridings because of his deep roots in Yorkshire

With fond childhood memories of holidays in Goathland and a career working in Yorkshire-based businesses, Richard wanted to give something back to the communities and places that had given him so much.

He was amazed and a little surprised to hear that Two Ridings support around 600 charitable organisations. When Richard started looking into them, he quickly realised that they all deserved money. "Many are very small but all are making such an impact in their communities. It's difficult to know where to start when you're looking to make charitable donations, and I didn't want the charities themselves to have to expend a lot of valuable time explaining or justifying their missions to me."

I loved that there's a simple process for groups to apply for funding and for Two Ridings to get the grants out to them."

Richard also likes the people at Two Ridings. "I appreciate that the people at Two Ridings aren't pushy or aggressive. They have an intimate knowledge of the area, the issues communities face, and the people who live there, and that's their drive."

Richard set up a fund with Two Ridings to benefit people in North Yorkshire. He feels Two Ridings has the expertise and the heart to make sure that money will do the greatest good possible.

Janet left us a legacy so her local community benefits long after her death

Knowing she had a terminal condition, Janet contacted Two Ridings to discuss leaving a legacy after her death, in memory of her daughter. She wanted her money to support the community they lived in and the local people within it. And she wanted that to be their legacy, for ever.

It's never easy to think about your own demise, but Janet felt good about leaving a positive legacy in the community she loved which will support people in York and the East Riding for years to come.

David and Sara were early donors to the Cost of Living Crisis fund. David is a local businessman and Sara recognises the foundation's important role in the region.

Nimbuscare set up a community fund to further support the communities they work in

Nimbuscare is an at scale primary care provider with 11 GP practices around York. Patients are at the heart of their every thought and, as a not-for-profit, being able to give back to the community is important. Their grant making addresses issues they see affecting their patients.

They chose Two Ridings as they had heard great feedback about the team's knowledge and relationships with local groups. They find the decision-making panels extremely well chaired, and appreciate the transparent and open process.

Nimbuscare have enjoyed visiting some of the groups their fund has supported. They have loved seeing how Two Ridings connect the groups up and facilitate shared learning and partnerships. Those relationships bring all the work together, completing the circle.

Investing in systemic approaches to tackling loneliness and increasing volunteering

In 2022, Two Ridings received its largest amount of funding to date for distribution within one city, with £1.3 million to invest in Hull. The Know Your Neighbourhood Fund, established by the UK Government will increase volunteering and tackle loneliness throughout the city, with some organisations receiving £150,000 over 3 years.

Two Ridings worked closely with local community and infrastructure organisations to create partnerships to deliver the projects and to join up different leaders and communities to maximise the impact of the funding. We are running Communities of Practice throughout the funding period to support learning and help facilitate long term change.

Harriet Johnson at Two Ridings said:

"Hull is a vibrant city with lots of great organisations and leaders already making a huge impact on the lives of many people.

"What's happening is so exciting. It has the potential to improve the wellbeing of the entire city, because the projects will reach deep into communities often left out when support is available, and people will work together – collaboratively – to really strengthen society."

Place based funds

THE LOCAL FUND for the Harrogate district has been supporting the people and community organisations of the area for over 5 years. Despite a reputation for being a place of prosperity, there is much hidden need in the area, with many local people facing significant social issues.

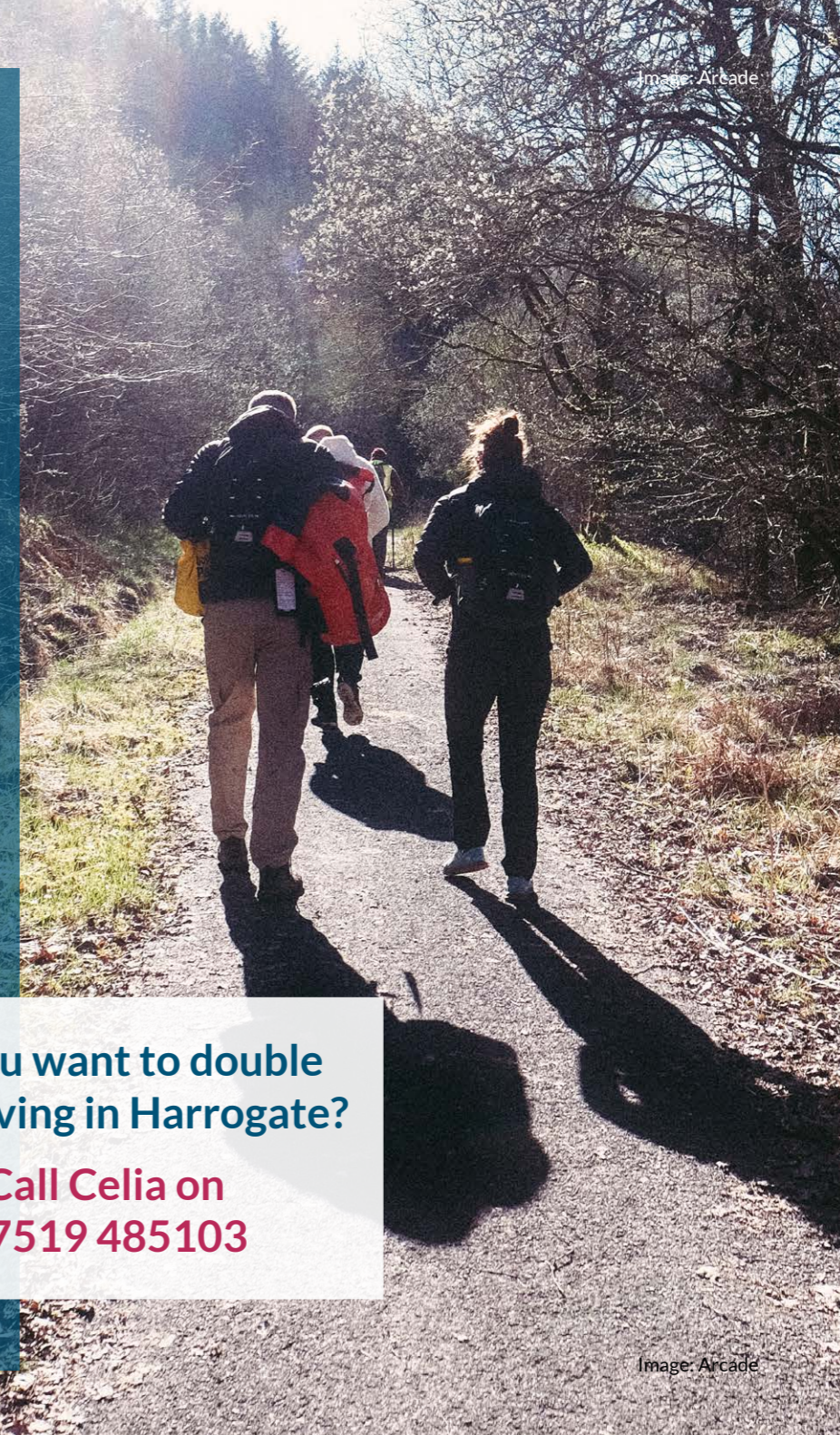
Often overlooked by national funding, Harrogate & District Community Action and the then local council joined forces with Two Ridings to create this place-based endowment fund. Local businesses, the council and generous local people, as well as income from the Local Lotto, have created an endowment fund worth over £650,000 with annual distribution of grants of around £70,000.

Trusting local expertise

While the Dulverton Trust does not make grants directly to small, local charities, it partners with Community Foundations to fund groups operating at a local level. In 2021, the Dulverton Trust approached Two Ridings about a potential partnership. They knew we understood the challenges and strengths of the different communities in the region. In 2022/23, £85k was distributed to 18 groups spread all over Yorkshire.

Building self confidence

With funding from The Dulverton Trust, Arcade in Scarborough ran an eight week creative programme for young people, culminating in the production of their own film highlighting the plight of endangered regional bird species. Working with musicians, sound artists and film-makers, the young people experienced a rare and extraordinary opportunity to connect with nature, build confidence and learn new skills, all of which improved their self confidence and wellbeing.

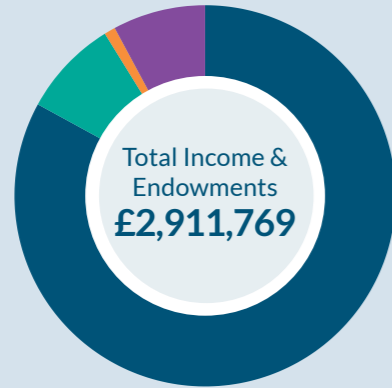
